

A Message from Pastor Sophy ~

Dear BUMC Community--

Maybe it's a bit cliche, but I tend to think a lot about gratitude and hospitality as we head towards the Thanksgiving holiday. This year, I'm feeling very grateful for something I never anticipated getting so excited about: a parking lot! (No one warned me when I was in seminary that I'd pray so much about pavement when I became a pastor!) Our parking lot has been in desperate need of some TLC for quite some time, and this month it will be milled and completely resurfaced. I am so grateful for the ways our congregation and Day School are coming together to make this possible. The potholes and crumbling curbs have limited our ability to hold events and build community, especially around the holidays-- but not this year! The Church and Day School will be closed on November 20th and 21st while our pavers are working. On Sunday, November 23rd, we'll have one combined worship service at 10am, during which we'll bless and consecrate our new parking lot together. On Saturday, December 6th, we'll hold a Christmas Open House with games, crafts, and fun for the whole family. Then on December 13th, come by for our Annual Christmas Cookie Walk! You and your family are warmly invited to join in the fun.

All of this brings me to hospitality—to the holy work of welcoming people, making sure they have what they need, and helping them to feel a sense of belonging. Certainly, one kind of hospitality is a safe parking lot where children and folks with mobility challenges can easily move around. There are so many other kinds of hospitality that we practice here at BUMC, from our greetings in the narthex on Sunday mornings, to our school supply drive for the Parx racetrack ministry. I want to lift up in particular our new immediate aid initiative for folks experiencing financial hardship. This, too, is a sacred kind of hospitality. Every Communion Sunday, we'll be collecting grocery, gas, and pharmacy gift cards that can be quickly given out in the event of need. (You can also bring in non-perishable food items.) A Joyful Update on the BUMC Parking Lot!

We are able to share some long-awaited news! Pending weather, we will break ground on our **new parking lot on November 20th, and the work will be completed on November 22nd.** Your prayers, persistence, and generosity literally paved the way! (Get it? It's a parking lot pun!)

Getting to this point has taken a lot of work behind the scenes! In June 2025, BUMC applied for a loan with the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference of the UMC to cover the cost of the parking lot



repairs. Our paperwork was beautiful! Due to staffing issues and scheduling snafus at the Conference, our application review was delayed. In August, we were finally approved for the loan! But lest it be easy, we then faced further administrative obstacles to getting the funds transferred to us. Paul Lacerte, our BUMC Leadership

Board Chairperson, made many phone calls, sent many emails, and even tracked down 200-year- old paperwork (true story) until the money we were approved for was finally safely in our bank account. I hope you'll join me in offering him many thanks for his efforts!

Our parking lot repairs will allow us to safely welcome people of all ages, abilities, and mobility needs onto our beautiful church grounds. We'll be able to host more events, invite community groups into our space, and gather with greater ease.

Some of the funds have already been put to good use to repair plumbing, heating and air conditioning, the Fellowship Hall oven, our fire suppression system and many more items. A Day to Honor Our Veterans



On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection — a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans

Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).


















Native American Heritage Month 2025

November is Native American Heritage Month, also referred to as American Indian and Alaska Native Heritage Month. George H. W. Bush pushed forward a joint resolution that made November of 1990 the first official National Native American Heritage Month. Since then, cultural sites, museums, and native tribal councils have organized events to highlight their rich and diverse culture and history, to educate the young and to help Indigenous people continue to thrive.

Native American Heritage Month is more than dates on the calendar. It is a reminder to honor Native communities, their traditions, and the important contributions of Indigenous communities in the United States. While we often hear the Americas referred to as the "New World," the culture and history of this area of the world was anything but new when it was first discovered by Europeans.

This month is also meant to raise awareness about the unique historical and present-day struggles of Indigenous people in the US. Today, many Native American families still face challenges in housing, education, and access to essential services and clean water. The funds for many support programs previously created by local, state and federal organizations to help address these issues and improve the quality of life for Native nations have recently been cut or the programs have been discontinued.

American Indians and Alaska Natives make up about 2 percent of the total US population. There are hundreds of tribes across the nation, but, according to research, most people can only name a few, and even fewer are represented in today's media.

For those of us living in Eastern Pennsylvania, this month is a wonderful opportunity to research our local history and learn more about the Lenape people who first called the land we now live on home. The Lenape are the original inhabitants of eastern Pennsylvania, southern New York, New Jersey, and northern Delaware (collectively referred to as the Lenapehokink--"land of the Lenape"). For over 10,000 years they have been the

Members of the Lenape Nation Of Pennsylvania are the descendants of the Lenape people who stayed in their homeland and of those who went west to Ohio and returned. They are the Indigenous people of this land now called Pennsylvania. All members must submit records of their Lenape genealogy to be considered for membership. Today they are active in the revival of tradition and community.

Pennsylvania is the only state in the land of the Lenape that has not recognized its Indigenous peoples. Lenape nations in Wisconsin, Oklahoma, and Canada have been recognized by their respective federal governments. Lenape nations in New Jersey and Delaware have been recognized by their respective state governments.

The Lenape Nation of Pennsylvania is actively pursuing recognition by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, with the support of their many community friends and partners in Pennsylvania (and beyond). They are people who work in Pennsylvania businesses, vote for Pennsylvania officials, protect Pennsylvania rivers and watersheds, and attend Pennsylvania schools, colleges, and universities. They are currently calling on Pennsylvania officials to affirm their rights and acknowledge the legacy of the Lenape Nation of Pennsylvania. They have struggled for over 30 years in their attempt to garner recognition as the remaining Indigenous people of Pennsylvania. They also invite us all into a more harmonious and peaceful relationship with these lands at this point in our collective human history. Go to https://www.lenape-nation.org/ to learn more.

Every day is a good day to learn about Native People, communities, and issues. But this is especially true during Native American Heritage Month. Celebrate by learning about the history and culture of Native peoples, attending events celebrating Native-cultures, or sharing the stories of Native tribes and individuals. Start with small actions and help keep these traditions alive.

Regardless of how you choose to recognize the accomplishments of Indigenous peoples, be sure to pass the information on to family and friends or make it a group effort. We can all be part of creating a world in which Indigenous Peoples' contributions, culture, and history are respected, and where policies, practices, and procedures improve outcomes for Indigenous People and communities.





Question 1: Why did the United States government establish Indian reservations?

Answer: The government aimed to resolve the "Indian problem" by forcibly relocating Native Americans through policies like the Indian Removal Act (1830). This led to events like the Trail of Tears and the Navajo Long Walk, displacing Tribes from their ancestral lands.

Question 2: How did the government decide where to locate the reservations?

Answer: Reservations were typically placed in arid, unsuitable areas for agriculture and isolated from growing settlements. As settlers expanded westward, the government reclaimed most lands, pushing Native Americans to less-desirable territories. Currently, reservations occupy just 2.3% of the originally promised land.

Question 3: If I were to visit an Indian reservation, what should I expect to see today?

Answer: You would see a proud people — strong in tradition and values — but living in or near third-world conditions. Drive around the reservation and you'll see many of our people living in run-down houses and trailers, many of which are without electricity, telephone, running water, or a sewage system. Native Americans on reservations face extreme poverty, making them the poorest population in the Northern Hemisphere.

Question 4: How can these conditions exist in a rich and powerful country like the U.S.?

Answer: Historical government policies concentrated Native Americans in remote, barren regions with added transportation costs. Reservation lands, held in trust, discourage outside investment and job creation. Unemployment rates range from 35-85%, and basic services are often hours away, contributing to challenging living conditions. Even the most basic services — healthcare, retail stores, pharmacies, and schools — are often an hour or more away, and families are forced to choose between using what little money they have to buy gasoline for the car or food for the children.

Question 5: Why didn't I know about this before?

Answer: Lack of awareness is common, and sharing information is crucial to addressing the issue. Urgent needs include food and water; one in four Native Americans on reservations lacks sufficient food. Southwest Reservation Aid® (SWRA) focuses on building self-sufficient communities, starting with providing essential resources.
